Dear Sir:

As you know this brief visit to the Philadelphia Section was made necessary by the fact that there were three requests that came in too late last season and two more which reached the office more recently. As soon as I can clear the decks of these I will get to the New England Section.

Today I drove to the Woodcrest Country Club in the Haddonfield and Berlin district of south Jersey. This was at the request of P. G. A. member Bruce Coltart. I may say that today I telephoned sectional president Ed Dudley, informing him of my presence in his section. He expressed his pleasure and told me that he would have other requests lined up on the occasion of my next visit, which will probably not be for a year.

At Woodcrest Coltart and myself were accompanied by the president of the corporation, which controls the club, - T. W. Goldtcorp. As their problems concentrated definitely on the last five holes, the major part of my examination concerned these. I gave full instructions for their development, entirely rearranging the Fifteenth; partially recontouring the Sixteenth green and introducing a Master Pit on the left of the Seventeenth after dog-legging to the hole from a new teeing ground on the left. The Eighteenth will do nicely. After the close examination of these holes we inspected the other holes on the course and I made such comments as seemed in order.
